

U.S. Embassy Bahrain
Demonstration Notice 20 – March 19, 2013

Spontaneous demonstrations take place in Bahrain from time to time in response to world events or local developments. United States citizens should keep current with media coverage of local events and be aware of their surroundings at all times. If you encounter a large public gathering or demonstration, depart the vicinity immediately.

The U.S. Embassy reminds U.S. citizens that there may be increased demonstrations, attempts to disrupt traffic, protests near economic centers, suspicious packages planted, tire fires and additional clashes against police during the time period from February 20, 2013 to March 31, 2013.

Today, March 19, 2013, anti-government demonstrations have been called for in the vicinity of Bilad Al Qadeem.

At 7:45 pm (1945), Al Wafaq has called for a gathering at their headquarters in Bilad Al Qadeem. Expect possible road closures and traffic congestion. It is strongly recommended that you avoid this area. (Yellow Circle)

At 9:00 pm (2100), opposition groups have called for a demonstration in Bilad Al Qadeem. Expect possible road closures, traffic congestion, and clashes between government forces and protesters. We strongly recommend you avoid this area. (Yellow Circle)

It is important to note that there have been no direct attacks on U.S. citizens in Bahrain to date. That said, spontaneous and at times violent anti-government demonstrations occur in some neighborhoods, particularly at night and on weekends. These demonstrations have included blockades of major highways with burning debris and establishment of unofficial checkpoints. Participants have thrown rocks and Molotov cocktails and used various other homemade weapons, including isolated use of improvised explosive devices. The Ministry of Interior maintains official checkpoints in some areas and routinely uses tear gas and stun grenades along with birdshot and other crowd control measures against demonstrators. Violent clashes between security forces and demonstrators can make travel in and around Bahrain dangerous without advance warning.

Please see below for a map. Areas shaded in red are off-limits to U.S. Citizen Embassy employees and their family members. Areas shaded in blue are off-limits to U.S. Citizen Embassy employees and their family members 20:00 – 04:00.

We remind U.S. citizens that even demonstrations intended to be peaceful can turn confrontational and possibly escalate into violence. U.S. citizens are therefore urged to avoid the areas of demonstrations if possible, and to exercise caution if within the vicinity of any demonstrations.
