1.0 DESCRIPTION

The U.S. Embassy - Bogota requires services to maintain building elevators in safe, reliable and efficient operating condition. The contract type is a firm fixed price contract for routine maintenance services paid at the monthly rate below. These rates include all costs associated with providing elevator maintenance services in accordance with manufacturer's warranty including materials, labor, insurance (see FAR 52.228-4 and 52.228-5), overhead, profit and VAT (if applicable). The contract will be for a one-year period, with four one-year optional periods of performance.

2.0 PRICING

2.1 VALUE ADDED TAX

VALUE ADDED TAX. Value Added Tax (VAT) is not included in the CLIN rates. Instead, it will be priced as a separate Line Item in the contract and on Invoices. Local law dictates the portion of the contract price that is subject to VAT; this percentage is multiplied only against that portion. It is reflected for each performance period. The portions of the solicitation subject to VAT are: See 2.2 through 2.6.

1.0 EQUIPMENT AND PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS

1.1 The American Embassy Bogota, Colombia is requesting a proposal from qualified elevator service companies to provide maintenance and repair for five (5) elevators. Proposal shall include a description of the elevator company's standard preventative maintenance service, exclusions, service checklist, quality assurance plan, and terms.

1.2. The Contractor shall provide all necessary managerial, administrative and direct labor personnel, as well as all transportation, equipment, tools, supplies and materials required to perform inspection, maintenance, and component replacement as required to maintain the systems in accordance with this work statement.

2.0 SCHEDULED PREVENTIVE MAINTENANCE

2.1. General

2.1.1. The Contractor shall perform preventive maintenance as outlined in Exhibit A - STATEMENT OF WORK (SOW). The objective of scheduled preventive maintenance is to eliminate system malfunction, breakdown and deterioration when units are activated/running.

2.1.2. Exclusion.

Contractor shall not: supply and replace incandescent or fluorescent lamps for car light fixtures, or floor covering on elevator car platforms; make renewals or repairs necessitated by reason of negligence or misuse of equipment by persons other than the Contractor or Contractor's representatives and employees, or by reason of cause beyond control of Contractor, except normal wear and tear; nor add new attachments as may be recommended or directed by inspection firms or by federal, state, municipal, or other government authorities.

Chancery Building three (3) passenger traction elevators: does NOT include replacement parts. This contract does NOT include repair of equipment and replacement of hardware (e.g. breakers) for the traction elevators. **Hardware replacements will be separately priced out by the Contractor for the Government's approval and acceptance.** The Government has the option to accept or reject the Contractor's quote for parts and reserves the right to obtain similar spare parts from other competitive sources. If required by the Government, the Contractor shall utilize Government-purchased spare parts, if awarded the work. Such repairs/replacements will be accomplished by a separate purchase order. However, this exclusion does not apply if the repair is to correct damage caused by Contractor negligence.

2.1.3. Replacement/repair of any electronic or electrical parts must be approved by the Contracting Officer Representative (COR) prior to installation of the part. If the Contractor proceeds to replace any electronic or electrical parts without COR approval, the Contractor shall de-install the parts at no cost to the Government.

2.2 Checklist Approval

The Contractor shall submit to the COR or his/her designee a schedule and description of preventive maintenance tasks which the Contractor plans to provide. The contractor shall customize a work sheet to match the equipment or use a factory supplied one outlining the sequence of events and tasks to be performed. The Contractor shall prepare this schedule, work sheet, and task description in a checklist format for the COR's approval prior to work commencement.

2.2.1. The Contractor shall provide trained technicians to perform the service on the equipment called out in this SOW. The technician shall sign off on every item of the checklist and leave a copy of this signed checklist with the COR or the COR's designate after each maintenance visit.

2.2.2. It is the responsibility of the Contractor to perform all manufacturers' recommended preventive maintenance as well as preventive maintenance recommended by the manufacture technical manuals for the respective equipment.

3.0 PERSONNEL, TOOLS, CONSUMABLE MATERIALS AND SUPPLIES

The Contractor shall provide trained technicians with the appropriate tools and testing equipment for scheduled maintenance, safety inspection, and safety testing as required by this Purchase Order. The Contractor shall provide all of the necessary materials and supplies to maintain, service, inspect and test all the systems to be maintained.

3.1 Contractor furnished materials will include but not limited to appropriate tools, testing equipment, safety shoes and apparel for technicians, hands, hearing and eye protection, MSDS, cleaning material and oil spill containment kit. Expendable/consumable items (e.g. hoses, belts, oil, chemicals, coolant, filters (Air, Fuel, Oil), generator starting batteries, grease, sealant, thermostat, fuse), will be maintained in the onsite inventory by Post.

3.2 Repairs. See Item 2.1.2. Exclusions.

3.3 Disposal of used oil, fuel, battery and other toxic substances. All material shall be disposed of according to Government and Local law.

4.0 TEST AND INSPECTION FIELD REPORT

The contractor shall provide one copy of a typed summary report within 15 days of site work statement completion. At a minimum the report must include:

- All findings, repairs or corrective measures completed, and inspection/testing checklists.
- A detailed report noting any noted discrepancy and a narrative summary of the corrective

- action required. The repair action will be quoted separately.
- A Bill of Materials (BOM) as necessary for any required repair parts for future corrective action or repair. The BOM must note component name, part #, vendor or source, approximate lead time, and suggested retail price.
 - A separate Bill of Materials (BOM) as necessary for any recommended spare parts for the system.
 - A detail report covering all aspects of equipment upgrading, system modification, and new part installation in all locations.
 - A “marked-up” as-built drawing as necessary to indicate any modifications or differences found during inspection.

5.0 INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

5.1 Personal Injury, Property Loss or Damage (Liability). The Contractor assumes absolute responsibility and liability for any and all personal injuries or death and property damage or losses suffered due to negligence of the Contractor’s personnel in the performance of this Purchase Order.

The Contractor’s assumption of absolute liability is independent of any insurance policies.

Exhibit A - - STATEMENT OF WORK (SOW)

I. GENERAL INFORMATION:

The United States Embassy in Bogota, Colombia requires professional services to perform preventive maintenance work on the facility's elevators.

II. PROJECT REQUIREMENTS:

Contractor shall provide all supervision, qualified labor, tools, test equipment, and training to perform all tasks listed within this work statement. All personnel working in the vicinity of the elevators shall wear and/or use the appropriate Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) in performance of this work statement. Strict adherence to NFPA70-E and applicable OSHA and local safety standards must be maintained at all times.

Any questions or injuries shall be brought to the attention of the Post Occupation Safety and Health Officer (POSHO). As applicable, Material Safety Data Sheets (MSDS) shall be provided by the contractor for all HAZMAT materials. Copies will be provided to the POSHO for approval.

Contractor shall follow manufacturer specific maintenance and testing procedures, and general industry practices to ensure operational readiness of the buildings' elevators. Contractor shall perform cleaning, testing and training on these systems following procedures and general operational requirements for these types of elevators. The contractor shall include the Embassy Locally Engaged Staff (LES) assigned mechanics in all aspects of this site work, providing "On the Job Training" (OJT) of the local staff as much as possible. It will be the responsibility of the contractor to explain proper safety and maintenance procedures as part of the OJT program. No formal classroom training is requested or required.

This service Purchase Order is for planned maintenance only. If any discrepancies are found that are not covered under this scope of work then the contractor must provide the following:

1. Detailed report noting the discrepancy found.
2. Bill of Materials (BOM) to include component name, quantity, part #, and price for any repair material required and the material lead time noted.

The contractor must clean up after each task and place all maintenance associated trash in the proper embassy dumpster or approved trash container.

IV. SCOPE OF WORK - - ELEVATORS PREVENTIVE MAINTENANCE

Contractor shall provide all materials, supervision, labor, tools and equipment to perform preventive maintenance. This must include, but is not limited to, belts, fuses, and dielectric lubricant.

Prior to beginning any site work the contractor must submit to the COR or his/her designee a Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) and schedule to reflect the planned work and sequence. The contractor must obtain written approval from the COR or his/her designee noting the planned servicing schedule and all required elevator outages.

If any discrepancies are found with the elevator system that are not covered under this scope of work then the contractor must provide the following:

1. Detailed report noting the discrepancy found.
2. Bill of Materials (BOM) to include component name, quantity, part #, and price for any repair material required and material lead time.
3. Price quote for repair labor.

7.0 PERMITS

The Contractor shall maintain in full force and affect all permits, licenses, and appointments required for the prosecution of work under this contract at no additional cost to the Government. The Contractor shall obtain these permits, licenses, and appointments in compliance with host country laws.

8.0 LOCAL LAW REGISTRATION

The QASP provides a method for the Contracting Officer's Representative (COR) to monitor Contractor performance, advise the Contractor of unsatisfactory performance, and notify the Contracting Officer of continued unsatisfactory performance. The Contractor, not the Government, is responsible for management and quality control to meet the terms of the contract. The role of the Government is to monitor quality to ensure that contract standards are achieved.

The COR shall notify the Contracting Officer of the complaints so that the Contracting Officer may take appropriate action to enforce the inspection clause (FAR 52.212-4, Contract Terms and Conditions-Commercial Items), if any of the services exceed the standard.

10.4. Procedures.

10.4.1 If any Government personnel observe unacceptable services, either incomplete work or required services not being performed they should immediately contact the COR.

10.4.2 The COR will complete appropriate documentation to record the complaint.

10.4.3 If the COR determines the complaint is invalid, the COR will advise the complainant. The COR will retain the annotated copy of the written complaint for his/her files.

10.4.4 If the COR determines the complaint is valid, the COR will inform the Contractor and give the Contractor additional time to correct the defect, if additional time is available. The COR shall determine how much time is reasonable.

10.4.5 The COR shall, as a minimum, orally notify the Contractor of any valid complaints.

10.4.6 If the Contractor disagrees with the complaint after investigation of the site and challenges the validity of the complaint, the Contractor will notify the COR. The COR will review the matter to determine the validity of the complaint.

10.4.7 The COR will consider complaints as resolved unless notified otherwise by the complainant.

10.4.8 Repeat customer complaints are not permitted for any services. If a repeat customer complaint is received for the same deficiency during the service period, the COR will contact the Contracting Officer for appropriate action under the Inspection clause.

“Inverted domestic corporation”, as used in this section, means a foreign incorporated entity which is treated as an inverted domestic corporation under [6 U.S.C. 395\(b\)](#), *i.e.*, a corporation that used to be incorporated in the United States, or used to be a partnership in the United States, but now is incorporated in a foreign country, or is a subsidiary whose parent corporation is incorporated in a foreign country, that meets the criteria specified in [6 U.S.C. 395\(b\)](#), applied in accordance with the rules and definitions of [6 U.S.C. 395\(c\)](#). An inverted domestic corporation as herein defined does not meet the definition of an inverted domestic corporation as defined by the Internal Revenue Code at [26 U.S.C. 7874](#).

“Manufactured end product” means any end product in Federal Supply Classes (FSC) 1000-9999, except—

- (1) FSC 5510, Lumber and Related Basic Wood Materials;
- (2) Federal Supply Group (FSG) 87, Agricultural Supplies;
- (3) FSG 88, Live Animals;
- (4) FSG 89, Food and Related Consumables;
- (5) FSC 9410, Crude Grades of Plant Materials;
- (6) FSC 9430, Miscellaneous Crude Animal Products, Inedible;
- (7) FSC 9440, Miscellaneous Crude Agricultural and Forestry Products;
- (8) FSC 9610, Ores;

(9) FSC 9620, Minerals, Natural and Synthetic; and

(10) FSC 9630, Additive Metal Materials.

“Place of manufacture” means the place where an end product is assembled out of components, or otherwise made or processed from raw materials into the finished product that is to be provided to the Government. If a product is disassembled and reassembled, the place of reassembly is not the place of manufacture.

“Restricted business operations” means business operations in Sudan that include power production activities, mineral extraction activities, oil-related activities, or the production of military equipment, as those terms are defined in the Sudan Accountability and Divestment Act of 2007 (Pub. L. 110-174). (ii) To disrupt, monitor, or otherwise restrict speech of the people of Iran; and

(2) Does not include information or informational materials the export of which the President does not have the authority to regulate or prohibit pursuant to section 203(b)(3) of the International Emergency Economic Powers Act ([50 U.S.C. 1702\(b\)\(3\)](#)).

“Service-disabled veteran-owned small business concern”—

(b) Certification. By submitting this offer, the offeror certifies that it is not:
