Military and Overseas Voters, Submit your Ballot Request for the August and September State Primaries and the General Election!

The following States will hold Primary Elections during August and September 2010 on the dates indicated.

August 3, 2010: Kansas, Michigan, Missouri

August 5, 2010: Tennessee

August 10, 2010: Colorado, Connecticut, Minnesota

August 17, 2010: Washington, Wyoming

August 24, 2010: Alaska, Arizona, Florida, Vermont

August 28, 2010: Louisiana (1st Party Congressional)

September 4, 2010: Guam

September 11, 2010: Virgin Islands

September 14, 2010: Delaware, District of Columbia, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York, Rhode Island, Wisconsin

September 18, 2010: Hawaii

Primary election dates are subject to change! To find out if your state's primary election date has changed use the FVAP election dates calendar found at <http://www.fvap.gov/vao/calendar.html>.

All States and Four Territories will hold the General Elections during on November 2, 2010. Puerto Rico will not be holding an election this cycle.

Register and Request Your Ballot Now!

All members of the U.S. Uniformed Services, their family members and citizens residing outside the U.S. who have not registered or requested an absentee ballot this year, should do so as soon as possible. To register or request an absentee ballot use the Federal Post Card Application (FPCA).

The FPCA and instructions for the above States are available at www.fvap.gov/FPCA. Click on your State on the map and follow the instructions to register and request an absentee ballot. Some States allow submitting the FPCA by fax or email in addition to regular mail. If your State allows an electronic alternative to mailing the form, FVAP recommends you use that option.

Send your **FPCA NOW** to your election office to ensure you have enough time to receive, vote, and return the ballot!
