



## CHILD VISA DROP-OFF CHECKLIST

Thank you for taking advantage of the child visa application process at U.S. Embassy – Kuwait. Please PRINT OUT a copy of this checklist and bring it, along with the materials described below, to the Embassy in order to apply for your child(ren)'s tourist visas.

### Requirements

To take part in the drop-off program, all children must be Kuwaiti citizens.

Children must be age 13 and younger, applying for a tourist visa. Adults or children aged 14 and older **MUST APPEAR FOR THEIR VISA INTERVIEWS**. In addition, please attach the following documents **WITH THIS COVER SHEET**:

- Printed confirmation page with barcode number, from a completed DS-160 application (link available on our website).
  - Two photos: 5 cm x 5 cm, taken within the last 6 months, white/light background, with full face towards the camera
  - Child's current passport. If the child has a current visa, provide the previous passport as well.
  - Copy of child's passport.
  - Visa application fee receipt: A Burgan Bank receipt, valid one (1) year from the date of issuance, for the \$160 application fee is required. Have your passport with you when paying the fee.
  - Copy of the sponsoring parent's passport and visa page.

Please bring all completed materials **WITH THIS COVER SHEET** to Window 2 at the front gate of the Embassy. At that time, if your application checklist is complete, you will be directed to DHL to arrange for delivery of the passports once the visas have been printed. If you fail to include this cover sheet on top of your visa application materials, we will ask you to return at a later date.

Drop-off applications may be submitted during the following times:

- Monday through Wednesday (excluding holidays)
- 1:00 PM to 3:00 PM

Please note that participation in the drop-off program does not guarantee issuance of a visa. We may contact you to arrange for an in-person interview, and/or may refuse a visa application if this checklist is not complete, or if the visa applicant(s) themselves do not meet the necessary requirements under U.S. Immigration law.
