

2014 STUDY OF THE U.S. INSTITUTE ON U.S. NATIONAL SECURITY POLICYMAKING

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1. Institute Objectives

This Study of the U.S. Institute is a rigorous post-graduate-level six-week academic seminar with integrated study tours whose purpose is to provide university faculty and other professionals from countries worldwide with a deeper understanding of the foundations of U.S. national security policy and current threats facing the United States. The program's ultimate goal is to promote the development and improvement of courses and teaching about the United States at universities and other educational, training, and research institutions abroad.

2. Program Description

The Study of the U.S. Institute on U.S. National Security Policymaking will provide a multinational group of 18 foreign university faculty with a deeper understanding of the foundations of U.S. national security policy and current threats facing the United States. The institute focuses on the formulation of U.S. foreign and national security policy and the role of the federal government, think-tanks, media, and public opinion in shaping that policy. The program will examine specific security issues such as twenty-first century defense requirements, counter terrorism strategies, energy security, economic stability, cyber-security, chemical and biological weapons, nuclear weapons, and infectious diseases. The program will also focus on regional security concerns in Africa, Europe, South Asia, the Western Hemisphere, East Asia, and the Middle East. The program will be supplemented by a simulation exercise, a group project, and a study tour to another region of the United States.

The host institution for this program will be the Institute for Training and Development (ITD) in Amherst, Massachusetts. Prospective applicants are encouraged to visit our website page to obtain general information about the Institutes at <http://exchanges.state.gov/susi>. The Institute is tentatively scheduled from March 7, 2014 to April 19, 2014.

3. Housing and meal arrangements

Typically, participants will have a private room with a shared bathroom during the residency portion (four weeks) of the Institute, and may share a hotel room with another participant of the same gender during the study tour (up to two weeks). During the residency, housing will typically be in college or university owned housing. Most meals will be provided at campus facilities, though participants may have access to a kitchen to cook some meals on their own. Full details will be provided once the grant has been approved. Care will be taken to ensure that any special requirements regarding diet, daily worship, housing, and medical care are satisfied.

4. Health Insurance

All participants will receive the Department of State's coverage of \$100,000, with a \$15 co-pay per medical visit, for the duration of the program. Pre-existing conditions are not covered. Information on the health benefit program may be found online at usdos.sevencorners.com.

5. Funding

The Study of the U.S. Institute will cover all participant costs including costs for program administration, international travel costs, domestic travel and ground transportation, housing and subsistence, books, cultural activities, mail, and incidentals.

6. Program requirements and restrictions

Participants are expected to participate fully in the program. Selected participants must attend all lectures and organized activities and complete assigned readings. Family members and/or friends cannot accompany participants on any part of the program [no exceptions]. Please note that Institute curriculum will not formally address teaching methodology and pedagogical methods. Candidates should be made aware that they are applying for an intensive program and there will be little time for personal pursuits unrelated to the program. The Institute is not a

research program. It is important that applicants understand and accept these requirements and restrictions.

7. Candidate qualifications

(A) Candidates should be mid-career, typically between the ages of 30-50, fluent in English, highly-motivated and experienced professionals from institutions of higher education, or national security policymaking institutions, including national military academies, government ministries, and think-tanks. The ideal candidate will be a specialist in international relations or a related field. While the educational level of participants will likely vary, most should have graduate degrees and have substantial knowledge of thematic area.

(B) The ideal candidate will be an experienced professional with little or no prior experience in the United States, whose home institution is seeking to introduce aspects of U.S. studies into its curricula, to develop new courses in the subject of the institute, to enhance and update existing courses on the United States, or to offer specialized seminars/workshops for professionals in U.S. studies areas related to the program theme. In this respect, while the nominee's scholarly and professional credentials are an important consideration, an equally important factor is how participation in the institute will enhance course offerings in U.S. studies at the nominee's home institution.

(C) Candidates should be willing and able to fully take part in an intensive post-graduate level academic program and study tour. While senior faculty members are eligible applicants, first consideration will be given to mid-career professionals, and to persons who are likely to be comfortable with campus life (including campus-style accommodations) and an active program schedule.

(D) In order to get a better sense of potential participants motivations and goals, candidates are requested to provide a short personal statement (one page) indicating why he or she is interested in participating in the program and what he or she expects to get out of the experience.

8. To apply for the institute
