Good evening:

I am **very happy** to be here tonight for this showing of **The Merikins**, right here in the heart of the Company Villages.

This **documentary** tells the story of brave man and women whose struggle for freedom was **nearly-forgotten**.

It demonstrates the **proud heritage** that many people here tonight share.

I first heard about the Merikins from my friend **Tina Dunkley**, who is here and you will hear from her shortly.

Tina, like many in the audience here is descended from those **freed slaves** who arrived in Trinidad **almost 200 years ago**.

Growing up in Trinidad she knew **almost nothing** about her family’s history until as an adult she began to research it.

Through her research she learned about the Merikin’s struggle for **freedom** and to find a new home.

Digging into the historical record she even found a **letter** from slave owners describing her ancestor’s **escape**.

This story **touched** me deeply and I decided that part of my mission in Trinidad and Tobago would be to **make sure** the story of the Merikins was told.

The United States is a nation **founded** on the principle that we are all created **equal** and that our freedom is an **inalienable** right.

But the government of the United States has **not** always lived up to that ideal.

The struggle of the Merikins shows that desire for **freedom** is found in the **hearts** of **every** man, woman and child.

And that **people**, if given a chance, will make **any sacrifice** to gain their freedom.

Although the Merikins were slaves in the United States they brought their **culture**, their **music** and their **religion** with them to Trinidad.

And, as you can see from the name, they were **proud** to be from America.

I am very **happy** that tonight we have a chance to open these **lost pages** of Trinidad and America's **shared history** and **remember** the courage of these forgotten freedom fighters through this documentary.
