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SECTION 1 - THE SCHEDULE

Continuation/Addendum to SF-1449, RFQ Number S-IZ100-11-Q-0053 PRICES, BLOCK 23

1.0 DESCRIPTION

The American Embassy in Baghdad, Iraq requires operation and maintenance services to the Al Jundi lift Station, International Zone, Baghdad, Iraq. The Al Jundi lift station provides services to different government properties within the International Zone, Baghdad deeming operations of the said facility critical to the overall mission.

The contract is for routine, scheduled maintenance and for unscheduled repair services or replacement of faulty equipment. These rates include all costs associated with providing maintenance services in accordance with manufacturer's warranty including materials, labor, insurance (see FAR 52.228-4 and 52.228-5), overhead and profit. The contract will be for a one year period.

1.1 TYPE OF CONTRACT

1.1.1 This is a fixed price type contract for scheduled maintenance services as defined in the Continuation/Addendum to SF-1449, Schedule of Supplies/Services, Block 20 Description/Specification/Work Statement. The fixed price will include all work, including furnishing all labor, materials, equipment and services, overhead (including cost of DBA Insurance and General Liability Insurance) and profit, unless otherwise specified.

1.1.2 An indefinite delivery/indefinite quantity type contract will be awarded for unscheduled work or urgently needed repairs or replacement equipment. Individual task orders will be issued for such repairs or replacement items. The fixed price shall include wages, overhead, general and administrative expenses, and profit. The Contractor shall submit a Cost Proposal specifying the actual work to be performed, as per instructions in Attachment # 1, Scope Of Work. The work and time of such performance shall be authorized by task orders issued by the Contracting Officer. Oral orders may be necessary for emergency services however, a Task Order shall be issued in writing within three business days of the oral instructions.

2.0 PRICING

2.1 Scheduled Maintenance Services

2.1.1 In consideration of satisfactory performance of all the scheduled services required under this contract, the contractor shall be paid a fixed-price per month for Scheduled Maintenance Services. No additional sums will be payable on account of any escalation in the cost of materials, equipment or labor or because of the contractor's failure to properly estimate or accurately predict the cost or difficulty of achieving the results required by the maintenance plans, nor will the contract price be adjusted on account of fluctuations in the currency exchange rate.

2.2 Unscheduled Repairs or Replacement Equipment

- 2.2.1 An indefinite delivery/indefinite quantity type contract will be awarded for unscheduled work or urgently needed services. Individual task orders will be issued using the fixed hourly rates identified below. The fixed hourly rates shall include wages, overhead, general and administrative expenses, and profit. Hours and labor categories for these task orders shall be negotiated into a firm-fixed-priced task order. The Contractor shall submit a Cost Proposal (see Attachment 3) specifying the actual amount of work to be performed, an estimate of the professional/technical effort required. The work and time of such performance, and the location of the property(ies) shall be authorized by task orders issued by the Contracting Officer. Oral orders may be necessary for emergency services however a Task Order shall be issued in writing within three business days of the oral instructions (see Attachment 4 for sample of an Unscheduled Task Order).

The contractor shall also be reimbursed for costs for any materials/equipment ordered under the task order issued by the Government in conjunction with the Unscheduled Services, as further described in 5.0. No profit shall be added to this material/equipment. All costs of materials/equipment shall be itemized on the invoice, such as purchase price of material/equipment, cost of transportation and cost of handling.

- 2.2.2 Costs allowed for Reimbursement to Contractor for Unscheduled/Emergency Services. If the contractor is required to order imported materials/equipment for unscheduled/emergency services to complete the repairs, the contractor is entitled to reimbursement at cost of transportation and handling charges. No overhead, profit, or other charge shall be considered. The contractor shall follow the instruction for duty-free clearance outlined in paragraph 2.2.3 below. Failure to comply with these referenced instructions shall not be grounds for reimbursement by the Government of any costs associated with customs clearance/duties.
- 2.2.3 Duty-free Clearance. The Contractor shall follow the instructions of the Contracting Officer as to the manner of labeling the shipping containers or otherwise processing shipments of imported materials in order to obtain or continue to receive, duty free clearance through customs. The Contractor shall be responsible for the payment of customs duties, if any, which (1) are imposed on items which are not labeled and processed in accordance with the Contracting Officer's instructions, (2) are imposed on the Contractor's tools, construction equipment and machinery imported for use on the project, or (3) are otherwise ineligible for duty-free entry.

2.3 Emergency Maintenance Services

- 2.3.1 Emergency services shall be issued and priced at the same rates as unscheduled services outlined in 2.2.1

2.4 Ordering

2.4.1 All supplies or services to be furnished under this contract for items 2.2 and 2.3 shall be ordered by the issuance of task orders by the U.S. Embassy Baghdad. Orders may be issued from the date of the Notice to Proceed until the end of the "Period of Performance" applicable to this contract.

2.4.2 The contractor will be asked to submit a cost proposal (sample shown in Attachment 2) when given a draft scope of work for an unscheduled task.

2.4.3 The Contracting Officer will negotiate and develop firm-fixed-priced task orders for each unscheduled or emergency task that needs to be performed.

2.4.4 All task orders are subject to the terms and conditions of this contract. This contract shall take precedence in the event of conflict with any order.

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3.0 NOTICE TO PROCEED

After contract award and submission of acceptable insurance certificates and copies of all applicable licenses and permits, the Contracting Officer will issue a Notice to Proceed. The Notice to Proceed will establish a date (a minimum of ten (10) days from date of contract award unless the Contractor agrees to an earlier date) on which performance shall start and continue for 12 months.

4.0 SPECIAL WARRANTIES

4.1 Special Warranty Obligations

4.1.1 Any special warranties that may be required under the contract shall be subject to the stipulations set forth in Section 2, 52.246-19 “Warranty of Systems and Equipment under Performance Specifications or Design Criteria”, insofar as they do not conflict with the provisions of such special warranties.

4.2 Warranty Information

4.2.1 The Contractor shall obtain and furnish to the Government all information which is required in order to make any subcontractor's, manufacturer's, or supplier's guarantee or warranty legally binding and effective, and shall submit both the information and the guarantee or warranty to the Government in sufficient time to permit the Government to meet any time limit requirements specified in the guarantee or warranty, but not later than completion and acceptance of all work under this contract. Unless otherwise specified, any surplus materials, fixtures, articles or equipment remaining at the completion of the project shall become the property of the Contractor, except those items furnished by the Government, the cost of which is not included in the contract price.

5.0 ISSUANCE OF TASK ORDERS FOR UNSCHEDULED/EMERGENCY WORK

5.1 Unscheduled work and emergency work shall be authorized only through the issuance of task orders executed by the Contracting Officer. Task orders shall be established on a firm fixed-price basis and shall be modified solely by a written modification executed by the Contracting Officer. Emergency services may require the use of oral orders however a written order shall be provided within 5 working days of the verbal authorization.

5.2 The contractor shall perform only those unscheduled/emergency services specifically authorized in the individual task orders issued under this contract. The contractor shall complete all work and services under this contract within the period of performance specified in the task orders except that no task order shall be issued hereunder after the expiration of this contract.

6.0 ORDERING OFFICIAL

In accordance with FAR 52.216-18 ORDERING (OCT 1995), the designated ordering individual for this contract is the Contracting Officer.

7.0 INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

- 7.1 Personal Injury, Property Loss or Damage (Liability). The Contractor assumes absolute responsibility and liability for any and all personal injuries or death and property damage or losses suffered due to negligence of the Contractor's personnel in the performance of this contract

The Contractor's assumption of absolute liability is independent of any insurance policies.

- 7.2 Insurance. The Contractor, at its own expense, shall provide and maintain during the entire period of performance of this contract, whatever insurance is legally necessary. The Contractor shall carry the following minimum insurance:

- 9.2 Worker's Compensation Insurance. The Contractor agrees to provide all employees with worker's compensation benefits as required by the laws of either the country in which the employees are working or the employee's native country, whichever offers greater benefits, following FAR 52.228-4 "Worker's Compensation and War-Hazard Insurance Overseas".

10.0 Permits.

The Contractor shall maintain in full force and effect all permits, licenses, and appointments required for the prosecution of work under this contract at no additional cost to the Government. The Contractor shall obtain these permits, licenses, and appointments in compliance with host country laws.

11.0 LOCAL LAW REGISTRATION

If the local law or decree requires that one or both parties to the contract register the contract with the designated authorities to insure compliance with this law or decree, the entire burden of this registration shall rest upon the Contractor. Any local or other taxes which may be assessed against the contract shall be payable by the Contractor without Government reimbursement.

12.0 QUALITY ASSURANCE AND SURVEILLANCE PLAN (QASP).

12.1 Plan. This plan is designed to provide an effective surveillance method to promote effective Contractor performance. The QASP provides a method for the Contracting Officer's Representative (COR) to monitor Contractor performance, advise the Contractor of unsatisfactory performance, and notify the Contracting Officer of continued unsatisfactory performance. The Contractor, not the Government, is responsible for management and quality control to meet the terms of the contract. The role of the Government is to conduct quality assurance to ensure that contract standards are achieved.

12.2 Surveillance. The COR will receive and document all complaints from Government personnel regarding the services provided. If appropriate, the COR will send the complaints to the Contractor for corrective action.

12.3 Standard. The performance standard is that the Government receives no more than one (1) customer complaint per month. The COR shall notify the Contracting Officer of the complaints so that the Contracting Officer may take appropriate action to enforce the inspection clause (FAR 52.212-4, Contract Terms and Conditions-Commercial Items), if any of the services exceed the standard.

12.4. Procedures.

12.4.1 If any Government personnel observe unacceptable services, either incomplete work or required services not being performed they should immediately contact the COR.

12.4.2 The COR will complete appropriate documentation to record the complaint.

- 12.4.3 If the COR determines the complaint is invalid, the COR will advise the complainant. The COR will retain the annotated copy of the written complaint for his/her files.
- 12.4.4 If the COR determines the complaint is valid, the COR will inform the Contractor and give the Contractor additional time to correct the defect, if additional time is available. The COR shall determine how much time is reasonable.
- 12.4.5 The COR shall, as a minimum, orally notify the Contractor of any valid complaints.
- 12.4.6 If the Contractor disagrees with the complaint after investigation of the site and challenges the validity of the complaint, the Contractor will notify the COR. The COR will review the matter to determine the validity of the complaint.
- 12.4.7 The COR will consider complaints as resolved unless notified otherwise by the complainant.
- 12.4.8 Repeat customer complaints are not permitted for any services. If a repeat customer complaint is received for the same deficiency during the service period, the COR will contact the Contracting Officer for appropriate action under the Inspection clause.

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1.0 PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Project Synopsis

The project shall provide Operation Maintenance services to the Al Jundi Lift Station.

BACKGROUND

At present DoD has a contractor maintaining the Al Jundi Lift Station. Once DoD leaves theater, said contract will come to a close. The Al Jundi Lift Station provides services to different government properties within the International Zone, Baghdad deeming the operations of said facility critical to the overall mission.

SOLUTION

Obtain the services of a contractor to maintain the Al Jundi Lift Station until such time that the local municipality can take over operations and maintenance.

2.0 GENERAL CONDITIONS

1. **Specifications.** The Work shall be governed by the *United States Department of State Overseas Buildings Operations New Embassy Compound, Baghdad, Iraq Master Specifications*. International Codes, which includes the International Building Code, International Mechanical Code, International Plumbing Code, and National Electric Code, also are applicable. Should there be a discrepancy between the NEC Specifications and the applicable Building Code, the more stringent of the two shall govern.

The Contractor is responsible for compliance with all Building Codes; Work not in compliance with the Codes shall be deemed unacceptable.

2. **Execution.** The Work shall be executed in a diligent and workmanlike manner in accordance with the negotiated fixed-price, this Scope of Work, the Project Schedule, International Building Codes, and the laws of the City of Baghdad where applicable.
3. **Work Hours.** Unless otherwise agreed by the COR or CO, the Work shall be executed during normal Embassy work hours. Night, weekend or holiday work shall not be permitted except as arranged in advance with the COR.
4. **Safety.** The Contractor shall be responsible for conducting the work in a manner that ensures the safety of residents, employees and visitors to the Embassy, and the Contractor's employees.
5. **Workforce.** The contractor shall provide all supervision, skilled and unskilled labor needed to perform the work. The contractor shall comply with embassy security policy by providing embassy approved escorts. Contractor provided escorts shall be in quantity sufficient to comply with RSO escort ratios for number of workers on the project. The contractor shall prepare requests to RSO for vetting of employees to obtain escort badges. The Contractor or government may request workers be badged for unescorted Embassy access by going through RSO vetting process.

6. **Subcontractors.** Contractor shall be responsible for the conduct and workmanship of Subcontractors engaged in the Project, and for Subcontractors compliance with the terms of this Statement of Work. The Contractor is responsible for the behavior and workmanship of Subcontractors while on Embassy property.
7. **Construction Cost Breakdown.** The Government provided “Construction Cost Breakdown” is for bid comparison only, and the contractor is responsible to field measure and to quantify the required materials and tasks as to complete the job.
8. **Submittals.** The contractor is responsible to submit shop drawings prior to fabrication and release of any materials for the FAC Engineer’s review and approval. The Engineer’s review, however, does not relieve of the contractor’s responsibility for the engineering work and to provide a complete working system.
9. **Excavation and Utilities.** The contractor is responsible to locate all existing utility lines prior to any excavation. Prior to disconnecting any existing utility services, the contractor is responsible to provide 48-hour advance notice to the COR.
10. **Housekeeping.** The contractor is responsible to clean up daily after working hours.

4.0 SCOPE OF WORK

Operational Maintenance Services for Al Jundi lift station

4.1 Task 1: Extended Maintenance

- a. Monthly Inspections & Maintenance – Contractor shall, for a period of one year from Notice to Proceed, perform the following maintenance functions on a monthly basis. Inspection items shall include, but are not limited to the following:
- b. Inspect main motors/pumps for proper operation & lubricate moving parts per manufacturer's recommendation.
- c. Inspect inlet screens for proper operation and lubricate moving parts per manufacturer's recommendation.
- d. Test all automatic controls and alarms and make repairs as needed

- e. Service generator as required manufacturer's recommendation. Change oil filters and fuel filters using manufacturer's recommended parts. Adjust voltage and frequency to proper level.
- f. By the 15th of each month, provide a written report to designated COR and the Contracting Officer of all inspections and service functions performed, the date performed, and any deficiencies identified during inspections.

4.2 Task 2: Inlet Screen Cleaning

- a. The contractor shall perform two cleanings of the screen system in the influent area during the twelve month period of performance. Cleaning shall include all actions related to removing all foreign material built up in the influent area including, but not limited to, the screens. Material shall be hauled offsite to an appropriate disposal area outside of the international zone as outlined in task 4.
- b. The contractor shall perform the first cleaning immediately following contract award.
- c. The contractor shall perform the second screen cleaning 180 days after contract award OR at the discretion of the COR.
- d. If additional cleanings are required, the contractor shall request authorization from the CO prior to proceeding.

4.3 Task 3: General Repairs and Replacement Equipment

- a. Repairs and replacement equipment are anticipated during the life of this contract. Repairs and replacement equipment require coordination and validation through the COR. Repairs and the purchases of replacement equipment are not to be obtained without the written authorization from the CO. The contractor shall be required to submit a realistic cost estimate for an authorized repair to the CO. The cost estimate will be itemized, showing the breakdown of the contractor's cost (i.e. labor and parts). The CO will sign and send a copy of the price estimate to the Contracting Officer prior to the authorization of repairs or purchase of replacement equipment.
- b. This will be funded with a not to exceed amount (NTE) dollar amount determined at time of award.

4.4 TASK 4: Removal of Sand from Wetwell, Reservoir, and Pumpwell

- a. The contractor shall, without interruption to service, remove all sand buildup from the wet well and any internal surfaces within the lift station. All removed sand will be disposed at a locally approved dump site (i.e. not on the lift station grounds).

4.5 Task 5: Refurbish Both High Capacity Pumps

- a. The contractor shall repair/replace any defective bushing, bearing, seals, or drive components to include but not limited to replacement of the drive shaft on pump # 1 and 2 as necessary. Contractor shall insure impeller, volute, casing or other

moving parts have not been excessively worn by sand abrasion, and will replace worn parts. Refurbishment will also include remount of pumps on the concrete foundation.

4.6 TASK 6: Repair Sluice Gate Operating Mechanism and Inlet Door

- a. The contractor shall remove the operating reach rod (reinsert once complete), machine as necessary to ensure proper operation under both manual and power (electric) modes, and inspect/repair all seals on the sluice gate.

4.7 TASK 7: Electrical System

- a. The contractor shall inspect, maintain and repair as needed all electrical components of the lift station. The intent of the USG is for the contractor to operate and maintain a fully functional system. A schedule and checklist for inspection and maintenance of the electrical system and associated components within the distribution system will be provided to and approved by the CO. Maintenance documents shall be per approved i.e. checklist and schedule by the CO.
- b. Provide a licensed electrician to perform all electrical work.
- c. The Contractor shall inspect maintain, and repair as needed all wiring and electrical connections in the control panels located throughout the distribution system. Contractor shall ensure that all replacement electrical components meet the National Electrical Code (NEC)2008 requirements for installation, grounding and bonding. Maintenance will be performed per the approved checklist and schedule.
- d. The Contractor shall replace all nonworking electrical components including circuit breakers as needed. Components shall be new and rated properly IAW National Electrical Code (NEC) 2008 requirements for installation, grounding and bonding.
- e. The Contractor shall ensure that phase corrections devices are properly maintained and automatically correct any phase changes as designed.
- f. The Contractor shall maintain electrical components to ensure all systems run in either automatic or manual mode as designed.
- g. The Contractor shall coordinate with local Minister of Electrical (MOE) to have the transformers recharged and make repairs to city power systems that supply power to Al Jundi Lift Station.

4.8 TASK 8: Facility and Grounds Maintenance

- a. Contractor shall inspect, maintain and repair as needed all structures, facilities and grounds. The intent of the USG is for the contractor to operate and maintain a fully functional system. A schedule and checklist for inspection and maintenance of the all structures, facilities, and grounds and associated components will be provided to and approved by the CO. Maintenance documents shall be per approved i.e. checklist and schedule by the CO.

- b. Plants, shrubs, bushes, and trees shall be kept at least one meter from and not overhang any structures or facilities. Greenery shall be groomed to present a neat appearance. Dead foliage shall be removed and disposed of in order to prevent safety mishaps.
- c. Grass surrounding any structure of the distribution system shall be kept to a height no greater than 10 centimeters. Dead grass may present a fire hazard and shall be removed and the exposed earth shall be covered with gravel.
- d. Maintenance at the Al Jundi Lift Station building shall cover a minimum, cleaning of all surfaces, repairs/replacing windows, painting, ensuring stairs and walkways are clear and safe, cleaning/clearing of interior/exterior sumps and ensuring they work as designed and pest control.

2. Commencement, Prosecution, and Completion of Work

The Contractor shall be required to (a) commence work under this contract within five (5) calendar days after the date the Contractor receives the Notice to Proceed, (b) prosecute the work diligently (c) for a period of one year.

6.0 RESPONSIBILITIES AND PROJECT MANAGEMENT

- 1. **COR.** A Contracting Officers Representative (COR) will be assigned to ensure quality assurance goals are met. The Contractor shall provide the COR access to the site at all times.

This individual shall keep a detailed photographic and written history of the project and shall update the Government weekly.

5. **General Requirements.** The contractor shall provide all management, labor, equipment, tools, transportation, materials, and other items necessary to maintain the Al Jundi Lift Station and provide preventative maintenance and inspection services in the International Zone, Baghdad, Iraq. The contractor shall perform all work in accordance with this statement of work and the relevant international standards.
6. **Government Furnished Equipment.** The U.S. Government will not furnish any equipment for this project.
7. **Contractor Furnished Vehicles.** The contractor shall provide and maintain all vehicles necessary to perform the requirements of this contract. All vehicles shall be registered and marked, with the company name, license insured, and operated in accordance with applicable traffic regulations by a licensed driver.

- (a) Any supplies and services to be furnished under this contract shall be ordered by issuance of task orders or task orders by the individuals or activities designated in the Schedule. Such orders may be issued from date of award through base period or option periods if exercised.
- (b) All task orders or task orders are subject to the terms and conditions of this contract. In the event of conflict between a delivery order or task order and this contract, the contract shall control.
- (c) If mailed, a delivery order or task order is considered "issued" when the Government deposits the order in the mail. Orders may be issued orally, by facsimile, or by electronic commerce methods only if authorized in the Schedule.

52.216-19 ORDER LIMITATIONS. (OCT 1995)

- (a) Minimum order. When the Government requires supplies or services covered by this contract in an amount of less than USD (to be entered at time of contract award), the Government is not obligated to purchase, nor is the Contractor obligated to furnish, those supplies or services under the contract.
- (b) Maximum order. The Contractor is not obligated to honor--
 - (1) Any order for a single item in excess of USD (to be entered at time of contract award);
 - (2) Any order for a combination of items in excess of USD (to be entered at time of contract award); or
 - (3) A series of orders from the same ordering office within 2 days that together call for quantities exceeding the limitation in subparagraph (1) or (2) above.
- (c) If this is a requirements contract (i.e., includes the Requirement clause at subsection 52.216-21 of the Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR)), the Government is not required to order a part of any one requirement from the Contractor if that requirement exceeds the maximum-order limitations in paragraph (b) above.
- (d) Notwithstanding paragraphs (b) and (c) above, the Contractor shall honor any order exceeding the maximum order limitations in paragraph (b), unless that order (or orders) is returned to the ordering office within 1 day after issuance, with written notice stating the Contractor's intent not to ship the item (or items) called for and the reasons. Upon receiving this notice, the Government may acquire the supplies or services from another source.

52.216-22 INDEFINITE QUANTITY (OCT 1995)

- (a) This is an indefinite-quantity contract for the supplies or services specified, and effective for the period stated, in the Schedule. The quantities of supplies and services specified in the Schedule are estimates only and are not purchased by this contract.
- (b) Delivery or performance shall be made only as authorized by orders issued in accordance with the Ordering clause. The Contractor shall furnish to the Government, when and if ordered, the supplies or services specified in the Schedule up to and including the quantity designated in the Schedule as the "maximum." The Government shall order at least the quantity of supplies or services designated in the Schedule as the "minimum."
- (c) Except for any limitations on quantities in the Order Limitations clause or in the Schedule, there is no limit on the number of orders that may be issued. The Government may issue orders requiring delivery to multiple destinations or performance at multiple locations.
- (d) Any order issued during the effective period of this contract and not completed within that period shall be completed by the Contractor within the time specified in the order.

The contract shall govern the Contractor's and Government's rights and obligations with respect to that order to the same extent as if the order were completed during the contract's effective period; *provided*, that the Contractor shall not be required to make any deliveries under this contract after one year beyond the contract's effective period.

52.217-8 OPTION TO EXTEND SERVICES (NOV 1999)

The Government may require continued performance of any services within the limits and at the rates specified in the contract. The option provision may be exercised more than once, but the total extension of performance hereunder shall not exceed 6 months. The Contracting Officer may exercise the option by written notice to the Contractor within the performance period of the contract.

52.217-9 OPTION TO EXTEND THE TERM OF THE CONTRACT (MAR 2000)

- (a) The Government may extend the term of this contract by written notice to the Contractor within the performance period of the contract or within 30 days after funds for the option year become available, whichever is later.
- (b) If the Government exercises this option, the extended contract shall be considered to include this option clause.
- (c) The total duration of this contract, including the exercise of any options under this clause, shall not exceed Three Years.

52.225-19 CONTRACTOR PERSONNEL IN A DESIGNATED OPERATIONAL AREA
OR SUPPORTING A DIPLOMATIC OR CONSULAR MISSION OUTSIDE
THE UNITED STATES (MAR 2008)

- (a) Definitions. As used in this clause—

“Chief of Mission” means the principal officer in charge of a diplomatic mission of the United States or of a United States office abroad which is designated by the Secretary of State as diplomatic in nature, including any individual assigned under section 502(c) of the Foreign Service Act of 1980 (Public Law 96-465) to be temporarily in charge of such a mission or office.

“Combatant commander” means the commander of a unified or specified combatant command established in accordance with 10 U.S.C. 161.

“Designated operational area” means a geographic area designated by the combatant commander or subordinate joint force commander for the conduct or support of specified military operations.

“Supporting a diplomatic or consular mission” means performing outside the United States under a contract administered by Federal agency personnel who are subject to the direction of a chief of mission.

- (b) General.
- (1) This clause applies when Contractor personnel are required to perform outside the United States—
 - (i) In a designated operational area during—
 - (A) Contingency operations;
 - (B) Humanitarian or peacekeeping operations; or
 - (C) Other military operations; or military exercises, when designated by the Combatant Commander; or
 - (ii) When supporting a diplomatic or consular mission—
 - (A) That has been designated by the Department of State as a danger pay post (see http://aoprals.state.gov/Web920/danger_pay_all.asp); or
 - (B) That the Contracting Officer has indicated is subject to this clause.
 - (2) Contract performance may require work in dangerous or austere conditions. Except as otherwise provided in the contract, the Contractor accepts the risks associated with required contract performance in such operations.
 - (3) Contractor personnel are civilians.
 - (i) Except as provided in paragraph (b)(3)(ii) of this clause, and in accordance with paragraph (i)(3) of this clause, Contractor personnel are only authorized to use deadly force in self-defense.
 - (ii) Contractor personnel performing security functions are also authorized to use deadly force when use of such force reasonably appears necessary to execute their security mission to protect assets/persons, consistent with the terms and conditions contained in the contract or with their job description and terms of employment.
 - (4) Service performed by Contractor personnel subject to this clause is not active duty or service under 38 U.S.C. 106 note.
- (c) Support. Unless specified elsewhere in the contract, the Contractor is responsible for all logistical and security support required for Contractor personnel engaged in this contract.
- (d) Compliance with laws and regulations. The Contractor shall comply with, and shall ensure that its personnel in the designated operational area or supporting the diplomatic or consular mission are familiar with and comply with, all applicable—
 - (1) United States, host country, and third country national laws;
 - (2) Treaties and international agreements;
 - (3) United States regulations, directives, instructions, policies, and procedures; and
 - (4) Force protection, security, health, or safety orders, directives, and instructions issued by the Chief of Mission or the Combatant Commander; however, only the Contracting Officer is authorized to modify the terms and conditions of the contract.
- (e) Preliminary personnel requirements.
- (1) Specific requirements for paragraphs (e)(2)(i) through (e)(2)(vi) of this clause will be set forth in the statement of work, or elsewhere in the contract.
 - (2) Before Contractor personnel depart from the United States or a third country, and before Contractor personnel residing in the host country begin contract performance in the

designated operational area or supporting the diplomatic or consular mission, the Contractor shall ensure the following:

- (i) All required security and background checks are complete and acceptable.
- (ii) All personnel are medically and physically fit and have received all required vaccinations.
- (iii) All personnel have all necessary passports, visas, entry permits, and other documents required for Contractor personnel to enter and exit the foreign country, including those required for in-transit countries.
- (iv) All personnel have received—
 - (A) A country clearance or special area clearance, if required by the chief of mission; and
 - (B) Theater clearance, if required by the Combatant Commander.
- (v) All personnel have received personal security training. The training must at a minimum—
 - (A) Cover safety and security issues facing employees overseas;
 - (B) Identify safety and security contingency planning activities; and
 - (C) Identify ways to utilize safety and security personnel and other resources appropriately.
- (vi) All personnel have received isolated personnel training, if specified in the contract. Isolated personnel are military or civilian personnel separated from their unit or organization in an environment requiring them to survive, evade, or escape while awaiting rescue or recovery.
- (vii) All personnel who are U.S. citizens are registered with the U.S. Embassy or Consulate with jurisdiction over the area of operations on-line at <http://www.travel.state.gov>.

(3) The Contractor shall notify all personnel who are not a host country national or ordinarily resident in the host country that—

- (i) If this contract is with the Department of Defense, or the contract relates to supporting the mission of the Department of Defense outside the United States, such employees, and dependents residing with such employees, who engage in conduct outside the United States that would constitute an offense punishable by imprisonment for more than one year if the conduct had been engaged in within the special maritime and territorial jurisdiction of the United States, may potentially be subject to the criminal jurisdiction of the United States (see the Military Extraterritorial Jurisdiction Act of 2000 (18 U.S.C. 3261 et seq.);
- (ii) Pursuant to the War Crimes Act, 18 U.S.C. 2441, Federal criminal jurisdiction also extends to conduct that is determined to constitute a war crime when committed by a civilian national of the United States; and
- (iii) Other laws may provide for prosecution of U.S. nationals who commit offenses on the premises of United States diplomatic, consular, military or other United States Government missions outside the United States (18 U.S.C. 7(9)).

- (f) Processing and departure points. The Contractor shall require its personnel who are arriving from outside the area of performance to perform in the designated operational area or supporting the diplomatic or consular mission to—
- (1) Process through the departure center designated in the contract or complete another process as directed by the Contracting Officer;
 - (2) Use a specific point of departure and transportation mode as directed by the Contracting Officer; and
 - (3) Process through a reception center as designated by the Contracting Officer upon arrival at the place of performance.
- (g) Personnel data.
- (1) Unless personnel data requirements are otherwise specified in the contract, the Contractor shall establish and maintain with the designated Government official a current list of all Contractor personnel in the areas of performance. The Contracting Officer will inform the Contractor of the Government official designated to receive this data and the appropriate system to use for this effort.
 - (2) The Contractor shall ensure that all employees on this list have a current record of emergency data, for notification of next of kin, on file with both the Contractor and the designated Government official.
- (h) Contractor personnel. The Contracting Officer may direct the Contractor, at its own expense, to remove and replace any Contractor personnel who fail to comply with or violate applicable requirements of this contract. Such action may be taken at the Government's discretion without prejudice to its rights under any other provision of this contract, including termination for default or cause.
- (i) Weapons.
- (1) If the Contracting Officer, subject to the approval of the Combatant Commander or the Chief of Mission, authorizes the carrying of weapons—
 - (i) The Contracting Officer may authorize an approved Contractor to issue Contractor-owned weapons and ammunition to specified employees; or
 - (ii) The Regional Security Officer may issue Government-furnished weapons and ammunition to the Contractor for issuance to specified Contractor employees.
 - (2) The Contractor shall provide to the Contracting Officer a specific list of personnel for whom authorization to carry a weapon is requested.
 - (3) The Contractor shall ensure that its personnel who are authorized to carry weapons—
 - (i) Are adequately trained to carry and use them—
 - (A) Safely;
 - (B) With full understanding of, and adherence to, the rules of the use of force issued by the Combatant Commander or the Chief of Mission; and
 - (C) In compliance with applicable agency policies, agreements, rules, regulations, and other applicable law;

- (ii) Are not barred from possession of a firearm by 18 U.S.C. 922; and
- (iii) Adhere to all guidance and orders issued by the Combatant Commander or the Chief of Mission regarding possession, use, safety, and accountability of weapons and ammunition.

(4) Upon revocation by the Contracting Officer of the Contractor's authorization to possess weapons, the Contractor shall ensure that all Government-furnished weapons and unexpended ammunition are returned as directed by the Contracting Officer.

(5) Whether or not weapons are Government-furnished, all liability for the use of any weapon by Contractor personnel rests solely with the Contractor and the Contractor employee using such weapon.

- (j) Vehicle or equipment licenses. Contractor personnel shall possess the required licenses to operate all vehicles or equipment necessary to perform the contract in the area of performance.

- (k) Military clothing and protective equipment.

(1) Contractor personnel are prohibited from wearing military clothing unless specifically authorized by the Combatant Commander. If authorized to wear military clothing, Contractor personnel must wear distinctive patches, armbands, nametags, or headgear, in order to be distinguishable from military personnel, consistent with force protection measures.

(2) Contractor personnel may wear specific items required for safety and security, such as ballistic, nuclear, biological, or chemical protective equipment.

- (l) Evacuation.

(1) If the Chief of Mission or Combatant Commander orders a mandatory evacuation of some or all personnel, the Government will provide to United States and third country national Contractor personnel the level of assistance provided to private United States citizens.

(2) In the event of a non-mandatory evacuation order, the Contractor shall maintain personnel on location sufficient to meet contractual obligations unless instructed to evacuate by the Contracting Officer.

- (m) Personnel recovery.

(1) In the case of isolated, missing, detained, captured or abducted Contractor personnel, the Government will assist in personnel recovery actions.

(2) Personnel recovery may occur through military action, action by non-governmental organizations, other Government-approved action, diplomatic initiatives, or through any combination of these options.

(3) The Department of Defense has primary responsibility for recovering DoD contract service employees and, when requested, will provide personnel recovery support to other agencies in accordance with DoD Directive 2310.2, Personnel Recovery.

- (n) Notification and return of personal effects.
- (1) The Contractor shall be responsible for notification of the employee-designated next of kin, and notification as soon as possible to the U.S. Consul responsible for the area in which the event occurred, if the employee—
- (i) Dies;
 - (ii) Requires evacuation due to an injury; or
 - (iii) Is isolated, missing, detained, captured, or abducted.
- (2) The Contractor shall also be responsible for the return of all personal effects of deceased or missing Contractor personnel, if appropriate, to next of kin.
- (o) Mortuary affairs. Mortuary affairs for Contractor personnel who die in the area of performance will be handled as follows:
- (1) If this contract was awarded by DoD, the remains of Contractor personnel will be handled in accordance with DoD Directive 1300.22, Mortuary Affairs Policy.
- (2)(i) If this contract was awarded by an agency other than DoD, the Contractor is responsible for the return of the remains of Contractor personnel from the point of identification of the remains to the location specified by the employee or next of kin, as applicable, except as provided in paragraph (o)(2)(ii) of this clause.
- (ii) In accordance with 10 U.S.C. 1486, the Department of Defense may provide, on a reimbursable basis, mortuary support for the disposition of remains and personal effects of all U.S. citizens upon the request of the Department of State.
- (p) Changes. In addition to the changes otherwise authorized by the Changes clause of this contract, the Contracting Officer may, at any time, by written order identified as a change order, make changes in place of performance or Government-furnished facilities, equipment, material, services, or site. Any change order issued in accordance with this paragraph shall be subject to the provisions of the Changes clause of this contract.
- (q) Subcontracts. The Contractor shall incorporate the substance of this clause, including this paragraph (q), in all subcontracts that require subcontractor personnel to perform outside the United States—
- (1) In a designated operational area during—
- (i) Contingency operations;
 - (ii) Humanitarian or peacekeeping operations; or
 - (iii) Other military operations; or military exercises, when designated by the Combatant Commander; or
- (2) When supporting a diplomatic or consular mission—
- (i) That has been designated by the Department of State as a danger pay post (see http://aoprals.state.gov/Web920/danger_pay_all.asp); or
 - (ii) That the Contracting Officer has indicated is subject to this clause.

(End of clause)

52.228-3 WORKERS' COMPENSATION INSURANCE (DEFENSE BASE ACT) (APR 1984)

The Contractor shall (a) provide, before commencing performance under this contract, such workers' compensation insurance or security as the Defense Base Act (42 U.S.C. 1651, et seq.) requires and (b) continue to maintain it until performance is completed. The Contractor shall insert, in all subcontracts under this contract to which the Defense Base Act applies, a clause similar to this clause (including this sentence) imposing upon those subcontractors this requirement to comply with the Defense Base Act.

52.232-19 AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS FOR THE NEXT FISCAL YEAR. (APR 1984)

Funds are not presently available for performance under this contract beyond September 30 of the current calendar year. The Government's obligation for performance of this contract beyond that date is contingent upon the availability of appropriated funds from which payment for contract purposes can be made. No legal liability on the part of the Government for any payment may arise for performance under this contract beyond September 30 of the current calendar year, until funds are made available to the Contracting Officer for performance and until the Contractor receives notice of availability, to be confirmed in writing by the Contracting Officer.

52.246-19 WARRANTY OF SYSTEMS AND EQUIPMENT UNDER PERFORMANCE SPECIFICATIONS OR DESIGN CRITERIA (MAY 2001)

(a) Definitions. As used in this clause—

“Acceptance” means the act of an authorized representative of the Government by which the Government assumes for itself, or as an agent of another, ownership of existing and identified supplies, or approves specific services rendered, as partial or complete performance of the contract.

“Defect” means any condition or characteristic in any supplies or services furnished by the Contractor under the contract that is not in compliance with the requirements of the contract.

“Supplies” means the end items furnished by the Contractor and related services required under this contract. Except when this contract includes the clause entitled Warranty of Data, supplies also mean “data.”

(b) Contractor's obligations.

(1) The Contractor's warranties under this clause shall apply only to those defects discovered by either the Government or the Contractor within 30 days after installation.

(2) If the Contractor becomes aware at any time before acceptance by the Government (whether before or after tender to the Government) that a defect exists in any supplies or services, the Contractor shall—

(i) Promptly correct the defect; or

(ii) Promptly notify the Contracting Officer, in writing, of the defect, using the same procedures prescribed in paragraph (b)(3) of this clause.

(3) If the Contracting Officer determines that a defect exists in any of the supplies or services accepted by the Government under this contract, the Contracting Officer shall promptly notify the Contractor of the defect, in writing, within 5 working days after the discovery of the defect. Upon timely notification of the existence of a defect, or if the Contractor independently discovers a defect in accepted supplies or services, the Contractor shall submit to the Contracting Officer, in writing, within 3 working days a recommendation for corrective actions, together with supporting information in sufficient detail for the Contracting Officer to determine what corrective action, if any, shall be undertaken.

(4) The Contractor shall promptly comply with any timely written direction from the Contracting Officer to correct or partially correct a defect, at no increase in the contract price.

(5) The Contractor shall also prepare and furnish to the Contracting Officer data and reports applicable to any correction required under this clause (including revision and updating of all other affected data called for under this contract) at no increase in the contract price.

(6) In the event of timely notice of a decision not to correct or only to partially correct, the Contractor shall submit a technical and cost proposal within 3 working days to amend the contract or Task Order to permit acceptance of the affected supplies or services in accordance with the revised requirement, and an equitable reduction in the contract price shall promptly be negotiated by the parties and be reflected in a supplemental agreement to this contract.

(7) Any supplies or parts thereof corrected or furnished in replacement and any services reperformed shall also be subject to the conditions of this clause to the same extent as supplies or services initially accepted. The warranty, with respect to these supplies, parts, or services, shall be equal in duration to that set forth in paragraph (b)(1) of this clause, and shall run from the date of delivery of the corrected or replaced supplies.

(8) The Contractor shall not be responsible under this clause for the correction of defects in Government-furnished property, except for defects in installation, unless the Contractor performs, or is obligated to perform, any modifications or other work on such property. In that event, the Contractor shall be responsible for correction of defects that result from the modifications or other work.

(9) If the Government returns supplies to the Contractor for correction or replacement under this clause, the Contractor shall be liable for transportation charges up to an amount equal to the cost of transportation by the usual commercial method of shipment from the place of delivery specified in this contract (irrespective of the f.o.b. point or the point of acceptance) to the Contractor's plant and return to the place of delivery specified in this contract. The Contractor shall also bear the responsibility for the supplies while in transit.

(10) All implied warranties of merchantability and “fitness for a particular purpose” are excluded from any obligation under this contract.

(c) Remedies available to the Government.

(1) The rights and remedies of the Government provided in this clause—

(i) Shall not be affected in any way by any terms or conditions of this contract concerning the conclusiveness of inspection and acceptance; and

(ii) Are in addition to, and do not limit, any rights afforded to the Government by any other clause of this contract.

(2) Within 7 working days after receipt of the Contractor’s recommendations for corrective action and adequate supporting information, the Contracting Officer, using sole discretion, shall give the Contractor written notice not to correct any defect, or to correct or partially correct any defect within a reasonable time at the proposed sites.

(3) In no event shall the Government be responsible for any extension or delays in the scheduled deliveries or periods of performance under this contract as a result of the Contractor’s obligations to correct defects, nor shall there be any adjustment of the delivery schedule or period of performance as a result of the correction of defects unless provided by a supplemental agreement with adequate consideration.

(4) This clause shall not be construed as obligating the Government to increase the contract price.

(5)(i) The Contracting Officer shall give the Contractor a written notice specifying any failure or refusal of the Contractor to—

(A) Present a detailed recommendation for corrective action as required by paragraph (b)(3) of this clause;

(B) Correct defects as directed under paragraph (b)(4) of this clause; or

(C) Prepare and furnish data and reports as required by paragraph (b)(5) of this clause.

(ii) The notice shall specify a period of time following receipt of the notice by the Contractor in which the Contractor must remedy the failure or refusal specified in the notice.

(6) If the Contractor does not comply with the Contracting Officer’s written notice in paragraph (c)(5)(i) of this clause, the Contracting Officer may by contract or otherwise—

(i) Obtain detailed recommendations for corrective action and either—

- (A) Correct the supplies or services; or
- (B) Replace the supplies or services, and if the Contractor fails to furnish timely disposition instructions, the Contracting Officer may dispose of the nonconforming supplies for the Contractor's account in a reasonable manner, in which case the Government is entitled to reimbursement from the Contractor, or from the proceeds, for the reasonable expenses of care and disposition, as well as for excess costs incurred or to be incurred;
- (ii) Obtain applicable data and reports; and
- (iii) Charge the Contractor for the costs incurred by the Government.

- be otherwise qualified and eligible to receive an award under applicable laws and regulations.

4.2 COMPETITIVE RANGE DETERMINATION AND REJECTION OF OFFERS

The Government intends to make award without discussions on the basis of initial proposals received. However, the Government may elect to make award with discussions if it is determined to be in the Government's best interest.

If the Government elects to make award with discussions, it reserves the right, before requesting a final proposal revision, to: 1) limit the number of offerors in the competitive range to the greatest number of proposals that will permit an adequate competition among the technically acceptable proposals; 2) make more than one competitive range determination; 3) conduct more than one round of discussions; and 4) conduct more than one round of proposal revisions.

The Government reserves the right to reject an offer if one of the following conditions exists:

- a) Offeror fails to submit any of the required proposal documents required by Section 3;
- b) Offeror submits a cost/price proposal that cannot be adequately explained or substantiated;
- c) Offeror submits an offer that could not be made technically acceptable without a major rewrite.
- d) Offeror submits an offer electronically to any email address other than to BaghdadGSOProcBid@state.gov
- e) The offeror does not provide proof that it has the permits and licenses to legally conduct business in Iraq (See Section 3.A.2.2)

- (5) FSC 9410, Crude Grades of Plant Materials;
- (6) FSC 9430, Miscellaneous Crude Animal Products, Inedible;
- (7) FSC 9440, Miscellaneous Crude Agricultural and Forestry Products;
- (8) FSC 9610, Ores;
- (9) FSC 9620, Minerals, Natural and Synthetic; and
- (10) FSC 9630, Additive Metal Materials.

“Place of manufacture” means the place where an end product is assembled out of components, or otherwise made or processed from raw materials into the finished product that is to be provided to the Government. If a product is disassembled and reassembled, the place of reassembly is not the place of manufacture.

“Restricted business operations” means business operations in Sudan that include power production activities, mineral extraction activities, oil-related activities, or the production of military equipment, as those terms are defined in the Sudan Accountability and Divestment Act of 2007 (Pub. L. 110-174). Restricted business operations do not include business operations that the person (as that term is defined in Section 2 of the Sudan Accountability and Divestment Act of 2007) conducting the business can demonstrate—

(b) Certification. By submitting this offer, the offeror certifies that it is not:

- (1) Taking or knowingly agreeing to take any action, with respect to the boycott of Israel by Arab League countries, which Section 8(a) of the Export Administration Act of 1979, as amended (50 U.S.C. 2407(a)) prohibits a United States person from taking; or,
- (2) Discriminating in the award of subcontracts on the basis of religion.
