They enjoyed a traditional Thanksgiving meal, which included sliced turkey, stuffing, mashed potatoes, salad, corn bread and pumpkin pie.



DVC on Cyber Bullying with Dr. Justin Patchin

The U.S. Embassy organized a Digital Video Conference on Cyber Bullying with Dr. Justin Patchin in Ankara on Wednesday, September 16, 2015.

Dr. Justin Patchin defined cyber bullying, and spoke about how the United States is addressing it from multiple angles (legally, within schools, and within the home, for example). He also addressed the issue of dissemination of incriminating and illegal photos of minors by other minors and how the US is dealing with this growing problem.

Eleven people attended the event, including exchange alumni and representatives from the Ministry of Justice, non-governmental organizations, and universities. After listening to Dr. Justin Patchin, they asked questions and conducted a spirited debate on the many issues related to this phenomenon in the U.S. and Turkey.

Two Turkish Fulbright Alumni enter MIT's "35 Innovators under 35 List"

The Massachusetts Institute of Technology's (MIT) Technology Review magazine included three Turkish women in its "35 Innovators Under 35" list this year. Two of them are Fulbright alumni: Canan Dağdeviren and Gözde Durmuş. They were selected due to the following accomplishments:



Canan Dağdeviren built a device that can measure changes in skin quality too slight to be detected by human touch. While working with dermatologists to develop the instrument, Dagdeviren found that it could be put to better use by screening for skin cancer, catching cancer earlier and helping patients avoid unnecessary biopsies.



Gözde Durmuş invented a simple, fast method for distinguishing cells by their distinctive physical characteristics by making them levitate in a magnetic field and measuring how high they rise. White blood cells, red blood cells, cancer cells, and different bacteria each rise to different heights because they have a characteristic density that determines the balance between the pull of gravity on the cell and the push of magnetism. Durmus has found that when a bacterial cell responds to an antibiotic, it tends not to rise as high in the magnetic field as it did before. This change can now be detected in about an hour instead of a day.

News about Alumni Projects

This month the U.S. Mission in Turkey is funding the project "Educate and Empower Girls to Stand up against Violence." Approximately 100 girls from a high school in the Balçova District of İzmir will be trained by experts on the dangers of domestic violence. A few months later, a separate session will be held to train their teachers on how to safeguard girls' rights and dignity in schools.

"We are educating our young women to put an end to this shame. Women of the future are advancing towards an equal, fair, and free world," says Assoc. Prof. Dr. Nesrin Oruç Ertürk, who is implementing the project.
