



United States Student Achievers Program (USAP) 2012 Application Form

There are many determined and talented, economically-disadvantaged students in Zambia who lack only financial resources and access to information to better their educational futures. For the fourth year, the United States Embassy seeks to identify highly academically qualified and motivated, low-income, students in Zambia to join the United States Student Achievers Program (USAP). USAP's mission is to assist highly-talented and determined, economically-disadvantaged students to negotiate and finance the admissions process for colleges and universities in the United States with the aim of producing highly-skilled and widely-educated leaders to build tomorrow's Zambia. USAP works closely with students through regularly scheduled meetings and workshops to assist them throughout the application process to secure admission and scholarships for colleges and universities in the United States. USAP finances all costs of the application process, including registration fees for required standardized examinations and provides free membership to the US Educational Advising Center for its participants. USAP expects a sincere commitment of students to give back their energy and time to the program and to their communities and to be the best they can be.

Students will work with our educational advising staff over this year and into the next year to try to secure places and financial assistance to begin study in the US in August 2013. ***ENTRANCE INTO THIS PROGRAM IS NO GUARANTEE OF A SCHOLARSHIP OR FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO STUDY IN THE UNITED STATES.***

To apply to USAP, you **must** currently be a highly-determined and hardworking student who is either in your final year of high school and who will write either the ECZ or Cambridge examinations in November 2012 OR who wrote the ECZ or Cambridge examinations in November 2011. To be eligible for consideration, you must have a **VERY** strong academic record, be actively involved in co-curricular and leadership activities and have a strong record of giving back to community. You must also demonstrate financial need that your family would not be capable of financing the US application process on your own.

We do not limit the program geographically; however, students must be able to reach the Embassy in Lusaka for workshops and on a monthly basis for meetings, for full participation. You **MUST** be able to come to Lusaka for the following program dates. Missing any of the USAP Program meetings or workshops will disqualify you from continuing in the USAP program. Similarly, there will be internal deadlines set for completing certain tasks, such as creating a list of schools to which to apply and collecting application documents. Missing any of these deadlines will disqualify you from continuing in the USAP program.

- 2) The attached letter of recommendation form attesting to your character, talent and skills completed by a teacher, school administrator, priest/pastor or NGO or community leader who knows you well, either typed or handwritten. Please do not include a basic testimonial that does not talk about you as an individual.
- 3) A copy of all school reports from 2011.
- 4) Write two essays, one from Group A and one from Group B, each of about 250 – 500 words:

Group A – Choose one only

Colleges and universities in the United States want to get to know you as a person, both in and out of the classroom. Use this essay as an opportunity to let us get to know you, how you think and what's important to you. As we want to get to know you as an individual and not look for the most dramatic tale, is essential that all experiences related in these essays be a true and accurate depiction of your life.

A1. *“I have a dream that one day on the red hills of Georgia, the sons of former slaves and the sons of former slave owners will be able to sit together at the table of brotherhood....”* Martin Luther King Jr.

One of the ways in which MLK’s dream was fulfilled was through the swearing in of Barack Obama as the first African-American US President. As a young Zambian, what are your dreams and aspirations?

A2. There is a Quaker saying: *“Let your life speak.”* Describe the environment in which you were raised-your family, home, neighborhood, or community-and how it influenced the person you are today.

A3. If you could be granted one super power, what would it be and how would you use it?

If you attend college or university in the US, you will be exposed to and will take a wide variety of subjects from the humanities, social sciences, and pure sciences. With this liberal arts educational philosophy in mind, please answer one of the following questions to demonstrate your intellectual strengths.

B3. What is the most significant problem facing Zambia today and if you were the President of Zambia, how would you solve the problem?
