The first step is to register with the local county voting officials. The general guidance is to register with the state of your most recent U.S. address. There are several options for submitting your registration:

- Option #2: You can submit a Federal Post Card Application (FPCA) to the local election office by email, mail or fax.
 - Complete the FPCA form:
 - You may complete the form by printing it out and filling it out by hand - <https://www.fvap.gov/uploads/FVAP/Forms/fpca2013.pdf>
 - OR you may complete the form using the online assistant here and then print it out - <https://www.fvap.gov/fpca-privacy-notice>
 - Then, send the FPCA form to your local election officials. If you are using the FPCA to **register to vote**, you **must mail** the form. If you are already registered and are using the FPCA to **request an absentee ballot**, you can **mail, email or fax** your signed form to your election officials. You will need to register as an **overseas voter** with your local election officials, and they will send you the ballots at your Hong Kong address.

Here is a basic overview of the overseas voting process:

5. You register as an overseas voter with your local election officials.
6. The local official approves your registration request or contacts you for further information.
7. The local official sends you an absentee ballot as the election nears.
8. You vote the ballot and send it back to your local officials in time to meet your state's deadline.
